 - 2. He corrects it in private by precept (17-23)
 - a. Spiritual defilement is not from the stomach (17-29)
 - b. Spiritual defilement is from the soul (20-23)

II. Jesus Reproved Unscriptural Racism (7:24-30)

- A. The Gentile woman requests help for her daughter (24-26)
- B. The Gentile woman is rejected as a hated dog (27)
- C. The Gentile woman responds in humble faith (28)
- D. The Gentile woman received healing for her daughter (29-30)

III. <u>Jesus Refused the Path of Self-Exaltation</u> (8:27-38)

- A. Jesus received the confession of His greatness (27-30)
 - 1. People confess Him to be great (27-28)
 - 2. Peter confesses Him to be Messiah (29-30)
- B. Jesus responded with the cross doctrine (31-33)
 - 1. Jesus taught of His suffering, death and resurrection (31)
 - 2. Peter rebuked Jesus for self-denial (32)
 - 3. Peter rebuked by Jesus for no spiritual discernment (33)
- C. Jesus recommended self-denial (34-38)
 - 1. The benefit of self-denial (34-35)
 - 2. The folly of self-exaltation (36-37)
 - 3. The shame of denying Christ (38)

<u>Lesson 9</u>: <u>Jesus Reveals His Glory, His Power, His Doctrine</u> (Mark 9)

<u>Key Verse</u>: "Jesus said unto him, If thou canst believe, all things are possible to him

that believeth." (Mark 9:23)

I. <u>Jesus Is Transfigured on the Mountain</u> (9:1-13)

(He gives a preview of the kingdom)

 - 1. Peter, James, John were with him (2)
 - 2. His appearance was chanced before them (2-3)
 - 3. Elias and Moses spoke with him (4)
- C. Jesus received reactions to it (5-13)
 - 1. He rejected Peter's fearful suggestion (5-6)
 - 2. He received God's endorsement (7)
 - 3. He requested their silence (8-10)
 - 4. He reasoned about Elias (11-13)

II. Jesus Is Troubled in the Valley (9:14-29)

- A. He is troubled about powerless disciples (14-19)
 - 1. The disciples could not cast out a demon (14-18)
 - 2. The disciples are rebuked as faithless (19)
- B. He is troubled by the father's lack of faith (20-27)
 - 1. He encourages the father to believe (20-23)
 - 2. The father asks help to believe (24)
 - 3. The demon is cast out (25-27)
- C. He teaches about faith and power (28-29)

III. Jesus Teaches on Important Doctrines (9:30-50)

- A. Jesus' discourse on the cross (30-32)
- B. Jesus' discourse on greatness (33-37)
 - 1. Jesus' disciples dispute over greatness (33-34)
 - 2. Jesus describes the attributes of greatness (35-37)
 - a. The truly great render humble service (35)
 - b. The truly great receive helpless children (36-37)
- C. Jesus' discourse on offenses (38-50)
 - 1. Offend not Christian brethren (38-41)
 - 2. Offenses have serious consequences (42)
 - 3. Offenses must be diligently avoided (43-50)
 - a. Better handicapped than an offender
 - b. Offenders will suffer in Hell
 - c. Offenses are avoided by spiritual salt

<u>Lesson 10</u>: <u>Jesus Declares His Doctrine</u> (Mark 10)

Key Verse: "And whosoever will be great among you, shall be your minister."

(Mark 10:43)

I. Jesus' Doctrine of Divorce (10:1-12)

 - 1. Divorce was condoned because of hard hearts (5)

 - 1. The test of His deity (18)
 - 2. The test of Mosaic law (19-20)
 - 3. The test of covetousness (21-22)
- C. Jesus teaches about riches and covetousness (23-27)

IV. Jesus' Doctrine of Rewards for Service (10:28-31)

- A. Sacrificial service has earthly rewards (28-30)
- B. Sacrificial service has eternal rewards (30)
- C. Sacrificial service has unpredictable rewards (31)

V. Jesus' Doctrine of the Cross (10:32-34)

VI. <u>Jesus' Doctrine of Future Glory</u> (10:35-45)

- A. Future glory is not determined by personality (35-40)

- C. Jesus' compassion results in heartfelt faith (52) (He met the spiritual need of the blind man)

<u>Lesson 11</u>: <u>Jesus' Messianic Authority</u> (Mark 11)

<u>Key Verse</u>: "And they that went before, and they that followed, cried, saying,

Hosanna; Blessed is he that cometh in the name of the Lord." (Mark 11:9)

I. <u>Jesus' Messianic Authority Is Proclaimed</u> (11:1-11)

- A. With authority He requested a donkey (1-6)
- B. With authority He rode the donkey (7-8)

 - 1. He expected the tree to have fruit (12-13)
 - 2. He condemned the tree to fruitlessness (14)
- B. Demonstrated by the curse fulfilled on the fig tree (20-21)
- C. Demonstrated by His command of faith and forgiveness (22-26)
 - 1. Faith is essential to answered prayer (22-24)
 - 2. Forgiveness is essential to cleansing prayer (25-26)

III. <u>Jesus' Messianic Authority Is Questioned</u> (11:15-19, 27-33)

- A. His authority was exercised in the temple (15-19)
 - 1. He drove money changers from the temple (15-16)
 - 2. He taught proper temple worship (17)
 - 3. His doctrine created trouble (18-19)
- B. His authority was questioned by the priests (27-28)
- C. His authority was defended by question (29-33)
 - 1. He asked about John's authority (29-30)
 - 2. They refused to answer about John (31-33)
 - 3. He refused to answer about Himself (33)

<u>Lesson 12</u>: <u>Jesus Answers His Adversaries with Biblical Doctrine</u> (Mark 12)

<u>Key Verse</u>: "The stone which the builders rejected is become the head of the corner."

(Mark 12:10)

I. Jesus' Doctrine of His Messianic Authority (12;1-12)

(The parable of the vineyard asserts His authority)

- A. Israel's rulers have violated God's trust (1-8)
 - 1. God entrusted them with Israel His vineyard (1)
 - 2. God was refused His due (2)
 - 3. They mistreated God's servants (3-5)
 - 4. They murdered God's Son (6-8)
- B. Israel's rulers will be judged and replaced (9)
- C. Israel's ruler will be Jesus the Messiah (10-11)
- D. Israel's rulers rejected His doctrine (12)

II. <u>Jesus' Doctrine of Citizenship</u> (12:13-17)

(A man should be loyal to God and government)

- A. Jesus was tested with a question on taxes (13-14)
- B. Jesus taught with a coin's inscription (15-16)
- C. Jesus taught that men should be good citizens (17)
 - 1. Men have responsibility to government
 - 2. Men have responsibility to God

III. Jesus' Doctrine of Resurrection (12:18-27)

(There is a resurrection but no marriage in it)

- A. Jesus was tested with a question on the resurrection (18-23)
 - 1. Take the case of levirate marriage (18-22)
 - 2. Whose wife will the woman be in the resurrection? (23)
- B. Jesus rebukes their ignorance of Scripture and God (24)
- C. Jesus answers the question about marriage (25) (No marriage in the resurrection)
- D. Jesus proves the resurrection from Scripture (26-27)

IV. Jesus' Doctrine of the Law (12:28-34)

(Love is the fulfillment of the law)

- A. Jesus was tested on the priority of law (28)
- B. Jesus taught on the priority of love (29-31)
- C. Jesus was commended on His doctrine (32-33)
- D. Jesus commended the scribe for his discernment (34)

V. Jesus' Doctrine of the Deity of Messiah (12:35-40)

(Messiah is the Son of God)

- A. Jesus tests the scribes about Messiah's sonship (35)
- B. Jesus teaches that Messiah is David's Lord (36)
- C. Jesus teaches that Messiah is Deity (37)
- D. Jesus teaches the danger of the scribes' hypocrisy (38-40)

(God regards the proportion not the abundance of one's giving)

III. Jesus Spoke of the Time during the Tribulation (13:9-22)

- A. The first half of the tribulation (9-13)
 - 1. The gospel will be proclaimed (10)
 - 2. Believers will be publicly persecuted (9, 11)
 - 3. Believers will be privately persecuted (12-13)
- B. The second half of the tribulation (14-23)
 - 1. The sign is the abomination of desolation (14)
 - 2. Believers in Judea should flee to mountains (15-18)
 - 3. There will be unparalleled tribulation (19-20)
 - 4. There will be great deception (21-23)

IV. Jesus Spoke of the Time after the Tribulation (13:24-27)

- A. There will be signs in the Heavens (24-25)
- B. The Son of Man will come with power and glory (26)
- C. The angels will gather the elect (27)

V. Jesus Spoke of the Time of the Tribulation (13:28-37)

- A. The parable of the fig tree (28-31)
 - 1. Israel, the fig tree, is a sign (28-29)
 - 2. All will be done in the fig-tree generation (30-31)
- B. The exact time is not known (32-33)
- C. Diligent watching is necessary (34-37)

<u>Lesson 14</u>: <u>Jesus Prepared for His Death</u> (Mark 14)

<u>Key Verse</u>: "And he said, Abba Father, all things are possible unto thee; take away

this cup from me: nevertheless not what I will, but what thou wilt."

(Mark 14:36)
